# From the Pastor



How can we conquer that supremely egotistical conviction that "of all that matters in the world I am all that matters?"

Certainly, by our very presence here we may be testifying to a desire to be delivered from such egocentricity. Surely we realize that to think and act and live only for ourselves, and to relegate the future to death and damnation is socially inexcusable, morally indefensible and humanely impossible. And to say of both the perils and the opportunities of the future: "So What? All that matters is that I survive," is so unlike some of our colonial ancestors. Again and again Thomas Jefferson alludes to the fact that in all his labors he is aware that he is writing and working not just for his generation but for posterity. John Adams writes to his wife Abigail, concerning the fiery trials through which the writers of the Declaration of Independence, and the

citizens of the new nation would have to go, but how worthwhile it is for they are building for their children and for their children's children and for all who will come after.

In the following century, Abraham Lincoln pointed out "We, when mounting the stage of existence, found ourselves the legal inheritors of fundamental blessings. We toiled not in the acquirement or establishment of them; they are a legacy bequeathed us by a once hardy, brave and patriotic race of ancestors. Theirs was the task (and nobly they performed it) to possess themselves, and through themselves us, of this goodly land, and to up rear upon its hills and its valleys a political edifice of liberty and equal rights; Tis ours only to transmit these the former unprofaned by the foot of an invader. The latter un-decayed by the lapse of time and untorn by usurpation to the latest generation that fate shall permit the world to know. This task, gratitude to our fathers, justice to ourselves, duty to posterity, and love for our species in general, all imperatively require us faithfully to perform."

Jefferson, Adams, and Lincoln remind us that the heritage which is ours is ours because in generations past, others thought not primarily of themselves, but of posterity. They did not coldly calculate that while tomorrow all might be lost, at least today would be okay. No, not at all. Somehow, somewhere, they seem to have been well-inoculated against the disease of kings.

And what of us? What of us? Surely a major breakthrough to healing is made when, in deed, as well as in word, by action, as well as by writ, we acknowledge the validity of the divine commandment that "we love our neighbors as ourselves" And that includes our neighbor's children, and their children's children. And "ourselves" includes us, and our children, and our children's children.

Another breakthrough occurs when the Golden Rule becomes a reality rather than a slogan; and one thinks in connection with the future as well as the present. In its simplest, the Golden Rule states: "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you." Born or unborn, living, or yet to live.

Another breakthrough will occur when we look at things with the mind of Christ; when the attitudes we possess are the attitudes He possessed; when our outlook on life is formed by the way He looked at things and at people.

They are the "model" for our prayers. Note that the prayers of Jesus describe his relationship and interactions with God.

Not only are we saving money by performing all financial accounting inhouse, but we are able to do our daily business more quickly and efficiently. And, we are also able to develop our own tracking procedures and reports to follow all income, expenses and where funds eventually go or belong.

For December, giving was very good. We hope this continues. However, our pledges have not yet come close to last year's level. The pledges are the basis for meeting the church budget expenses. Pledges typically cover 50% of our expenses, with non-pledge giving, donations, fundraisers, etc. making up the difference. Please consider making a commitment to the church with a pledge. This is your way of seeing that our church is able to pay the bills, perform our church functions, and expand our word into the community. Pledges are accepted anytime of the year.







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# **LESSER KNOWN CHURCH FACTS**



## THE TWELVE DAYS OF CHRISTMAS

Everybody knows what the Twelve Days of Christmas are, right? After all, we've been singing the Christmas song since we were old enough to talk: On the First Day of Christmas, my true love gave to me A partridge in a pear tree.

As the song progresses, the lucky recipient piles up gifts, each day receiving what he or she received the day before, as well as a new item—or rather items, since the generous giver pegs the quantity of his gifts to the number of the days of Christmas: Two turtledoves, Three French hens, Four collie birds (blackbirds; often mispronounced as "calling birds"), Five golden rings, Six geese a-laying, Seven swans a-swimming, Eight maids a-milking, Nine ladies dancing, Ten lords a-leaping, Eleven pipers piping, and Twelve drummers drumming.

But wait! There's more. While little harm (other than the perpetuation of misinformation) is likely to come from the "Twelve Days of Christmas" song, it would be better to use that space to celebrate the real Twelve Days of Christmas—the period between Christmas Day and Epiphany, in which we celebrate some of the most important, interesting, and spiritual symbolic feasts of the entire liturgical year. Some of these include:

First Day of Christmas—Dec. 25: Christmas Day Second Day of Christmas—Dec. 26: St. Stephen, Deacon & Martyr (Acts 6) Fourth Day of Christmas—Dec. 28, Holy Innocents (Matthew 2) Eighth Day of Christmas—Jan. 1, Holy Name Day (Luke 2) Twelfth Day of Christmas—Jan. 5, Twelfth Night, Eve of the Epiphany
