## Lay Leadership Classes at CVUMC

The Central West District of the Desert Southwest Conference will hold lay leadership classes at Chino Valley United Methodist Church on Friday evening and Saturday, July 29-30.

The purpose of Lay Servant Ministries is to enlist, train, guide and support lay servants as they equip and prepare others "for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ" (Eph 4:12).

Two classes will be presented.

- The Basic Course is an introductory course designed to equip new church leaders and renew current leaders in the UMC. The course introduces the three foundational focus areas of Lay Servant Ministries: Caring Ministries, Christian Leadership and Communications. This course will be taught by Jeannie Ward (of Prescott Valley UMC and Roger Harlow.
- The Advanced Course, God's Mission, Our Journey, will equip lay servants for more effective missional engagement in their communities and beyond, providing the theological foundation for mission volunteers. This course will be taught by Neil Leftwich, District Superintendent.

The cost for these courses is \$30.00, which includes dinner Friday and breakfast and lunch Saturday.

## From the Pastor



Well, as you may or may not know, Janet and I were gone to Liberty Lake, Washington (suburb of Spokane, Washington) for vacation and more importantly her daughter's wedding on June 11th; and then on to Annual Conference afterwards. We had a wonderful time at the wedding of course, and taking some much needed time off to rejuvenate our senses and to be filled with the Holy Spirit and to drink in the truth that Jesus told us.

This trip had me thinking about how many un-churched or "spiritual" people we both have met over the years and I wondered how they would feel, if they truly trusted and accepted Jesus Christ in their lives, how their lives would forever change.

When was the last time you fed a baby oatmeal, peaches or applesauce? How about my all time favorite green beans or peas? Regardless of what you

may be serving, when your baby does not want to eat, their entire body gets engaged in the struggle. The jaws become like cast iron, letting nothing enter the mouth. Any food that may miraculously make it past the lips is pushed out by an iron tongue. The baby develops great eye coordination at these times when you want it to finish the last few bites, but they have had enough. The spoonful headed for the mouth hits the ear instead; a small hand pushes the spoonful into your lap. How many of you have ever been there? Babies need to eat. Good nutrition is important for the growth and development of every infant. However, no matter how hard we may try, and regardless of how tasty the food may be, unless the baby is willing to eat, we cannot "fill it" with food. When the same baby is hungry or thirsty and is crying out, making its desire known, then it is much easier to "fill" the baby.

Similarly, the Holy Spirit does not force Himself to "fill us." In the same way that a baby needs to have a desire for food or drink to be willing to eat, we must also crave the presence of the Holy Spirit in our lives in order to be "filled with the Spirit." If we are to receive the Spirit, we must submit our minds, spirits and bodies to Jesus.

On the last and most important day of the festival, Jesus stood up and said in a loud voice, "Whoever is thirsty, come to me and, Whoever believes in me should drink. As the Scripture says, Streams of life giving water will pour out from his side." Jesus said this about the Spirit, which those who believed in him were going to receive. At that time the Spirit had not yet been given, because Jesus had not been raised to glory." (John 7:37-39) Jesus offers us "streams of living water." Jesus is not the little boy who set up a lemonade stand and offers you a small drink for a quarter; Jesus offers us an inexhaustible or limitless portion of no ordinary drink.

As we come to Jesus with the desire to be filled, we must choose to yield our bodies, specifically our tongues to God, in order for Him to fill us with the Holy Spirit. The Bible says we should "offer the parts of your body to Him" (Romans 6:13). Our tongue is the instrument which God empowers to speak an unknown language.

Let me put it to you in the simplest way I know; you cannot be filled with the Holy Spirit if you are unwilling to speak. If you "lock your jaw" like the baby who doesn't want to be "filled" with food, then you will remain silent, and God Pastor Mike won't fill you. Only as you choose to open your mouth can God give you the Spirit inspired words to speak and be filled with the Spirit.

Jesus didn't say, "If you are thirsty, come and be refreshed by my living water;" Jesus said, "If you are thirsty, Come to Me and drink." Jesus' emphasis is not upon what He will give you to drink; the focus is on Him as the one who provides you with what will satisfy your thirst.

"Come to me! Come to me and drink!" Jesus is the baptizer and He will fill you as you look to Him. We need to believe in Jesus. We need an open mind to be filled with the spirit. Jesus said, "whoever believes in me should drink". As the Scripture says, "Streams of life giving water will pour out from his side." (John 7:38).

We must believe in Jesus: accepting Christ as our personal Savior and being forgiven of our sin makes it possible for us to receive the baptism of the Holy Spirit.

Have you received the Holy Spirit since you accepted Jesus? Do you believe that Jesus wants you to be baptized in the Holy Spirit? Is it your desire to be filled? Are you ready to yield control and speak as His Spirit enables you? I certainly have, have you?

#### **On-Going Outreach Projects**



1. Bibles, hymnals, Sunday School materials & other inspirational materials are sent through Love Packages to missionaries around the world. (We have

already mailed 59 lbs. this year.) 300 tons have already been sent out by Love Packages in 2016. For example:

- A. 120,000 lbs to South Africa
- B. 40,000 lbs each to Bahamas, Jamaica, Liberia, Thailand, and Uganda
- C. 80,000 lbs each to Ghana, India, and Kenya
- 1. Clear water bottle lids, to be made into syringes for dialysis
- 2. Empty medicine bottles (labels removed) to be used for liquids, soap, etc., for Prescott area homeless.
- 3. Motel-size sundries (lotion, shampoo, toothpaste, combs, brushes, etc), individual size cereals, soups, hot chocolate, cider, etc., are used by Prescott Area Shelter Services.

All the above items may be left in the LOVE Box, found under the table in the Narthex.

5. Don't forget our Chino Valley Food Bank. Any food you place in the red wagon is delivered to the food bank weekly. People need to eat all 12 months of the year ~ the food bank is open Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

## Notes from the Lay Leader



#### Connectionalism

That is a big word with a lot of meaning to us Methodists.

This past week I had the honor of representing this congregation in part of that connectionalism.

On November 19 of this year we, CVUMC, will hold the beginning of the Methodist church's connectional journey. This is called the "Charge Conference." The term "Charge" comes from the Pastor's being assigned to a "Charge." This is the foundation to the concept of connectionalism. We will convene and agree to the budget, elect members to various committees, elect some chair persons, and make reports to our District Superintendent.

When the churches of the Desert Southwest Conference gathered together this past 16-19 June an "Annual" conference was convened. The theme for this year's

conference is: "Infuse." "I am the vine, you are the branches." Many decisions were reached, Pastors were moved, and a name was submitted to the Jurisdictional Conference so that they could elect a new Bishop.

This past May all worldwide conferences sent representatives to gather for the "General" conference. This conference is convened every four years and has representatives from the world wide church.

It is this concept of conference gatherings that leads to connectionalism within the United Methodist Church. It is this large scale gathering that connects all Methodists churches. We are one of the few denominations that have such a system. We are connected as a denomination.

If you are interested in further information the book; "Let's Go Fishing" covers this very nicely. I have a copy that you may borrow.

**Eagle** 

Eagles came to symbolize the Resurrection thanks to ancient legends that they renewed their youth, plumage or eyesight by flying near the sun, then diving into water. The eagle's upward movement made it a symbol of Jesus' ascension. John the Evangelist is represented by an eagle, for his "soaring" description of Christ's divinity. God's care is likened to an eagle in Bible verses such as Exodus 19:4: "I bore you on eagles' wings and brought you myself." (ESV).




Celebrate summer with this tasty dessert pizza, using your favorite summer fruits as the toppings.  $_{\rm A}$ 

#### What you need:

- 1 tube slice-and-bake sugar cookie dough
- Knife
- Round pizza pan
- 8 ounces cream cheese (
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>3</sub> cup sugar
- ½ teaspoon vanilla
- 2 cups sliced fruit
- Adult help

#### What you do:

- 1. Cut the dough into slices <sup>1</sup>/<sub>8</sub>-inch thick. Place slices on the pan, overlapping them slightly.
- 2. Bake at 375 degrees for 12 minutes. Let cool.
- 3. Combine softened cream cheese, sugar and vanilla, mixing well. Spread this "frosting" over the baked-cookie "crust."
- 4. Arrange fruit on top of the pizza.
- 5. Slice and enjoy!
