Annual Charge Conference

The church's annual charge conference is scheduled for Saturday, November 19, at 10:30 am. In preparation for the conference, please consider the following excerpt from *Just Say Yes! Unleashing People for Ministry* by Bishop Robert Schnase. This will be part of the agenda and discussion time.

Ways people say No:

- I don't need that, so why should we do it?
- Only five people signed up.
- They're not our members anyway.
- That's our room.
- That will never work here (and I'll see that it doesn't!)
- They can just join us.
- You're too young, too new, or too different.
- You didn't ask me first.
- Don't rock the boat.
- Things won't be the same.

1. Can you think of a time when you inadvertently used one of these behaviors or attitudes to express your resistance to a ministry idea?

2. Think of two or three successful ministries that have begun in this congregation in recent years. Where did the ideas come from? How were the ideas initially received? What form of resistance did the ideas face at first, and how did the ministries cone to fruition anyway?

- 3. Where do you see "what's in it for me?" thinking at work in this church or community?
- 4. "Successful churches and effective pastors are willing to do things that declining churches and unsuccessful pastors are unwilling to do. Growing churches say *Yes* to ministries that declining churches say *No* to. Do you agree? What do you see as some of the implications of this for this congregation?

Read Luke 6:1-11 and Matthew 9:9-13.

Jesus was surrounded by people seeking to restrain him, catch him in any infraction, and otherwise say No to his ministry. How did Jesus respond to his critics? How did he reframe encounters in order to direct people toward the mission God sent him to fulfill? How did he empower his disciples to take bold action for God's love?

Stepping Stones of the Steward



Over the years, the church's teaching about stewardship has matured so that it is no longer just about raising money to support the church (as important as that is!), but rather about using all that God has given to us for his purposes.

In a book entitled <u>Stepping</u> <u>Stones of the Steward</u>, Ronald Vallet has written about three metaphors drawn from the Scriptures. These metaphors are helpful to consider as we seek to align our lives with God's call upon us. The metaphors, as written by the author, are as follows:

God as Creator and Owner

God created all things. As part of the process of creation, God created human beings in the image of God and gave them particular responsibilities in relationship to the earth. (Genesis 1:27-30) That which God created is owned by God: "The earth is the Lords' and the fullness thereof..." (Psalm 24:1) God, therefore, may be thought of and described as Creator and Owner.

Jesus Christ as Chief Steward

When sin entered, God established a new covenant through Jesus Christ. Paul referred to God as "He who did not spare his own Son but gave him up for us all," (Romans 8:32) and Paul described Jesus as the one "who, though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied himself, taking the form of a servant." (Philippians 2:6-7)

Jesus Christ is presented not as owner, but as servant/ steward. We are called to participate with Christ as "stewards of the mysteries of God." (1 Corinthians 4:1) Since we participate as servants of Christ in the stewardship given to him, it is appropriate to refer to Christ as the Chief Steward.

Our relationship to Christ is to acknowledge him as "Lord Jesus Christ," (Philippians 2:10-11) even as we participate with him in stewarding the mysteries of God. And what are the "mysteries of God?" In short, they are God's purpose and plan for the world (Ephesians 1:9-10) It is another way of describing God's passion for the world and its redemption. (John 3:16) When viewed from this perspective, stewardship and evangelism are two sides of the same coin.

The Church as Steward

Christians are called to be stewards; the church of Jesus Christ is also a steward. The church is a trustee/agent of God's gospel for the world. When the church acknowledges Christ as head of the church (Ephesians 5:23) and stewards of the Gospel, even the power of death cannot prevail against it. (Matthew 16:16-18)

As we consider stewardship in terms of financial support of the church and its ministries, we also need to keep in mind the broader understanding of stewardship, as it provides a Biblical context for seeking financial pledges for the coming year.

From the Pastor



Do not forget to come to Charger Conference Saturday, November 19, 2016 at 10:30 am. It is important for the congregation to attend and learn what the officers of the church are doing and who the new Chair people will be.

On that note, I remember when I was asked to teach in the Church Bible Study many years ago, I was very insecure about it. However, I always knew not many people were willing to lead, and I felt like God was calling me to do so. So, here is what I have learned from stepping into leadership roles. Leading doesn't require massive amounts of knowledge, but it requires a willingness to show others the love of Christ by walking alongside them in their faith journey. It doesn't mean having all the answers, but it does require a willingness to dive deeper into theological questions together. It means admitting not knowing all the answers and responding, "Let's find out together." The apostles continued to bear powerful witness to the resurrection of the Lord Jesus, and an abundance of grace was at work among them all.

Peter and John were such a mess. They were thrown in jail, discouraged, and threatened by religious leaders to stop talking about Jesus. They were recognized by the council as uneducated and inexperienced followers of Jesus. Do you hear this? John and Peter had few qualifications to lead the early Christian church. What made them able to lead? They were followers of Jesus and given authority by Christ. They spoke out with boldness about what they had seen and heard. They went forward praying for boldness and giving God all the glory! They continued to grow the church and to lead others to Jesus Christ.

Please don't wait until you are feeling qualified in order to help others grow in their faith.

Don't be discouraged if you feel unqualified to lead. In order to be an efficient leader, you should research and continue to grow in your faith while listening to the Holy Spirit, but please don't wait until you are feeling qualified in order to help others grow in their faith. Can you imagine if Peter and John listened to the discouragement of the council and stopped leading others because they felt unqualified?

If you are thinking about leading, teaching, or mentoring others, then stop hesitating and just do it. Don't be afraid to fail and learn something with others. Or if you are already leading and feeling insecure, I pray you will experience boldness like Peter and John. Stop waiting until you have everything together and are feeling qualified. Go forth with faith that God can do more through you than you could possibly imagine.

Maybe it's time to read all of Acts 4 again.
