An Invitation from the Bishop

Recent events in our Conference, in the Western Jurisdiction, and in the General Church have prompted conversations and concern in our United Methodist congregations in the Desert Southwest Conference. Many persons have expressed their desire for clarity and explanations and an opportunity to share their feelings and opinions regarding topics such as human sexuality, interpretation of scripture, the Book of Discipline, the Social Principles, challenges to church unity and possible schism, and our future as a United Methodist Church.

Because these are very important issues that many persons want to discuss, I am inviting you and your congregation to join me in a time of Holy Huddle on the Unity of the Church. Holy Huddles will offer us the opportunity to engage in listening to and hearing one another as we share our concerns and thoughts about human sexuality and the church. In these Huddles, my role is to listen to your concerns, to share my perspective as your bishop, and to respond to questions you may have about any topic of concern. I will strive to create a safe space where we will be able to speak and listen with respect for others and pray together for our United Methodist Church in the spirit of Jesus Christ.

You are invited to a Holy Huddle with Bishop Hoshibata on January 12, from 2-4:30pm at the Prescott United Methodist Church. Call the church office for more information or to sign up to car pool to Prescott.

From the Pastor



All four Gospels speak of Jesus' baptism. Luke's version however, is a little different than the others.

The other three Gospel writers tell the story as artists during the Middle Ages often depicted Jesus' baptism...as a public event. A crowd of people who have come to be baptized by John are standing in or near the Jordan River. Jesus is standing waist deep in water. John the Baptist is standing next to Jesus and pointing to Him, as if to say, "This is the one for whom we have been waiting!" or, in the words of the Gospel writer John, "Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sins of the world!"

Symbolically, just above Jesus' head in these paintings, is the Holy Spirit, drawn as a dove, descending on Jesus. Both in the written texts and in the paintings, the dove is a physical symbol of the invisible Spirit of God.

In all four Gospel versions we are told that the Spirit descends on Jesus, "like a dove."

Remember, this is symbolism. The Holy Spirit is not a bird. Luke and the other apostles use the dove as a metaphor for the Spirit's coming into our lives.

Actually, it is a beautiful metaphor when you think about it. Have you ever seen a dove descend and land? They land much better than the clumsy great herons. A dove is graceful, gentle and quiet. That's key! The implication of the metaphor is that, that is the way the Holy Spirit will enter into our lives. The Holy Spirit came to Jesus graciously, gentle and quietly....but the difference in Luke's version is that it was a private experience.

That is why Luke's account is different than the other three gospels. The other writers imply that the Spirit descended upon Jesus at His baptism, apparently when He was still in the water, surrounded by people, just like those beautiful paintings from the Middle Ages. Luke, however says, *"Now when all the people were baptized, and when Jesus also had been baptized and was praying, the heaven was opened, and the Holy Spirit descended upon Him in bodily form like a dove."* Which means that the Epiphany, this special presence of God in this event, came to Jesus when he was by Himself, praying. In other words, it wasn't a public event. It was a personal and private experience. No one else saw it. No one else heard that voice from heaven. Jesus came out of the water, went off by Himself and prayed. That is when His call to ministry happened.

Personally, I appreciate all four accounts of Jesus' baptism in the Gospels. It's always a good thing to get different perspectives of the same event. Matthew, Mark and John remind us that each person's baptism welcomes him or her into the body of Christ, the Church. Baptism is a public witness of a person's commitment to Christ. At a person's baptism the church commits to helping the new convert to grow in the Christian faith, while also committing to work together for mission to the world empowered by the Holy Spirit.

Luke reminds us that baptism also has a personal impact on the life of the believer. Baptism says to each of us that, "You are a child of the covenant." Indeed, it is the ultimate sacrifice of Christ on the cross that seals the New Covenant for us. *"We are not our own, but the Lord's."*

Consider what this means. We are God's people. We belong to God. As Christians, we are not at the mercy of social values and cultural trends swirling and changing

around us. Instead, we are at the mercy of the Gracious triune God, who claims us in the clear cleansing waters of baptism.



Financially wise, for the first time in a number of vears, we ended 2016 in the black by over \$1000. Not a great amount, but at least we've improved our standing.

We would like to acknowledge several people who have provided their time and service to the Church. First is Ilona Dean. As of December, she stepped down as Church Treasurer. Ilona was our Treasurer who brought us into the world of computer finance. We wish to thank Ilona for her year of service to the church. Alice Merriman has taken over on a interim basis until a permanent replacement is found.

We'd also like to thank Carrie Cattbriga and Jan Harlow for performing our 2015 internal church financial audit. Both spent many, many hours of their time going over all of our church financial records and reports and found no major issues. In

appreciation, they both received a gift certificate from Earth Works.

The 2017 stewardship pledge drive was also a success. We received 28 pledges totaling about \$78,000. That is a high for us compared to the past prior few years. This commitment accounts for half of our annual budget. In order to satisfy our budget, we need about the same amount of giving from the remainder of the congregation over this year. Hopefully, after hearing our four stewardship drive readings, you will be in a mood of giving so that we can meet our budget and financial commitments.

Because Jesus is the light of the world, his followers don't need to fear darkness or life's dark times. Make this nightlight to remind you of Jesus' light and presence.




What you need:

- Work area with good ventilation
- Mason jar
- Clear glue that works on glass
- Paintbrush
- Glass stones
- Tealight candle
- Lighter
- Adult supervision

What you do:

- 1. Starting at the top of the jar, brush glue on a small section.
- 2. Press glass stones onto the glue in rows. Let dry.
- 3. Continue gluing stones, in small sections, until the entire jar is covered.
- 4. When dry, place a candle inside. Light with adult help.
