Shoeboxes

It is that time again....CHRISTMAS IN OCTOBER and NOVEMBER

Our Annual Operation Christmas Child (OCC) drive has started now, to give you time to shop for just the perfect items for a special child.

These shoeboxes will be delivered somewhere in the world to a child, 4 to 14 years of age, who may not be aware of Jesus or Chino Valley, AZ, or even the United States.

Many of these children may never have received a gift of their own filled with precious items to make their lives more enriched. They will also know someone is thinking about and praying for them.

All you have to do is look for the OCC table in the Narthex, beginning October 21, with boxes and information brochures available. Remember all items purchased must fit in a shoebox. A list of suggested items is on the bulletin board.

Pick up as many boxes as you, your children, or grandchildren would like to fill. Shop, pack the boxes, add \$9 for shipping and bring back to the church between November 11-18th. The boxes will be dedicated on Sunday, November 18th and will begin their journey that day.

If you do not wish to shop or cannot shop, a donation of \$30 will fill and ship a box.

We will be having a packing party on Saturday November 17, at 10am. Come help fill more boxes with donated items of toys, hygiene items, and school supplies. Donations to pay shipping for these boxes are also appreciated.

Did you know? We have over 250 homeless children in the Chino Valley Schools.

Did you know? There is no local school funding for the Homeless Program.

Public schools rely on Title 1 funding from the Federal Government. These funds subsidize a 15 hours-per-week position to work with homeless children and their families. Other than that, the program relies 100% on donations. The needs are ongoing. If we all do a little, we can make a difference!

Please help by donating what you can from the items listed below:

- New toiletries from motels/hotels
- New full-sized toiletries: deodorant, soap, shampoo, toothpaste, toothbrushes, nail clippers, brushes, combs, toilet paper, Kleenex, lotion
- Sanitary products for girls
- New underwear/panties and socks for girls and boys
- New or gently used (clean) winter coats, jackets, scarves, hats, gloves
- New or gently used (clean) children's or teen clothing
- New school supplies: two pocket folders, spiral notebooks, college-ruled filler paper, crayons, glue sticks, pencils, pens, child-sized scissors, colored pencils
- New or gently used (clean) towels and washcloths, pillows, pillow cases, blankets
- Laundry soap in small packages, small bottles of dish soap, Clorox wipes
- Breakfast bars, peanut butter, crackers, canned meat, tuna, cheese and cracker snacks, individual applesauce and fruit cups, other "grab and go" foods and snacks
- Gift cards to local restaurants like McDonalds, Taco Bell, Sonic, Pizza Hut, Little
 Caesar's and Subway in \$5-\$10 denominations for high school students on their own
- Gift certificates for free haircuts at Chino Valley barbers and/or beauty salons
- Vouchers or gift certificates for one night at out local motels (Days Inn and Primrose Inn)
- Monetary donations to fill other needs.

Christian Symbols



Plumb Line

In the writings of the prophets Isaiah and Amos, a plumb line is a symbol of God's judgment of Israel: "I will make justice the measuring line and righteousness the plumb line" (Isaiah 28:17, NIV); The Lord was standing by a wall that had been built true to plumb, with a plumb line in his hand. … Then the Lord said, "Look, I am setting a plumb line among my people Israel; I will spare them no longer" (Amos 7:7-8, NIV). When Jesus is portrayed as Judge of the world, he is sometimes shown holding a plumb line.



- pen
- round object to trace (about 4 inches across)
- lightweight colored paper
- scissors
- ruled notebook paper
- Chinese food takeout box (or small paper gift bag)
- hot glue gun

What you do:

- 1. Trace circles onto the colored paper and cut them out.
- 2. Cut strips of notebook paper and write messages to a friend (or Bible verses about friendship).
- 3. Fold each circle in half without making a crease. Secure the top center edge with glue.
- 4. Pull the outside edges together by creating a bend in the center of the paper. Undo the bend and insert the fortune.
- 5. Re-bend the "cookie" into shape and add glue inside to hold it in place.
- 6. Put all the "cookies" in a takeout box and give to your friend.
