Happy Advent Church!

You will notice this Advent there will be a change in the Sanctuary, as the Advent wreath will be placed in our very midst. We will be able to really engage the symbol as a couple of the rows of chairs will be slightly rearranged. Take notice of the three purple candles and the one pink. We light the wreath all four Sundays of Advent in order to remember that we are to be Christ's light in the world. On Christmas Eve the large white Christ Candle is lit for all to see.

Yes, we are changing or at least we (the Body of Christ) ought to be changing and becoming more like Christ. Every year at the start of the church year we take a deep look at ourselves and in order to assess whether we have grown in our faith and we make note of how we have changed. We look to the future and we share our hope with the world as we profess Christ, the Light of the World.

We celebrate the theme of expectant waiting as we once again prepare for the coming of Christ anew. We remember the baby Jesus as we prepare to meet the Cosmic Christ of the Holy Trinity in fullness, in the Second Coming. As we light the Advent Wreath again these four weeks of Advent, my prayer would be that we look to Christ anew, and we challenge ourselves to change one slight thing in our behavior in order to serve others in a way we haven't done before.

## Notes from the Certified Lay Minister



**ADVENT** 

Many of you know that I like to dig into where our church seasons come from and their meaning. The season of Advent is no different. So some information for you to make the season of Advent more meaningful.

As with many things in church history it is not known exactly when the period of preparation for Christmas or "Advent" first began – it was certainly in existence from about 480 AD – and the novelty introduced by the Council of Tours of 567 was to order monks to fast every day in the month of December until Christmas. It is "impossible to claim with confidence a credible explanation of the origin of Advent".

Associated with Advent was a period of fasting, known also as the Nativity Fast or the Fast of December.

The Second Vatican Council, in 1962-1965, introduced minor

changes to the meaning of the Advent season, differentiating the spirit of Lent from that of Advent, emphasizing Advent as a season of hope for Christ's coming now as a promise of his Second Coming.

While the Sunday readings relate to the first coming of Jesus Christ as Savior as well as to his Second Coming as judge, traditions vary in the relative importance of penitence and expectation during the weeks in Advent.

The Methodist Book of Worship identifies the colors purple or blue as appropriate for Advent. "There has been an increasing trend in churches to replace purple with blue during Advent as it is a hopeful season of preparation that anticipates both Bethlehem and the consummation of history in the Second Coming of Christ."

Many churches also hold special musical events, such as Lessons and Carols, Cantatas and the singing of portions of Handel's Messiah.

The concept of the Advent wreath originated among German Lutherans in the 16th Century. However, it was not until three centuries later that the modern Advent wreath took shape. The modern Advent wreath, with its candles representing the Sundays of Advent, originated from an 1839 initiative by Johann Hinrich Wichern, a Protestant pastor in Germany and a pioneer in urban mission work among the poor. In view of the impatience of the children he taught as they awaited Christmas, he made a ring of wood, with nineteen small red tapers and four large white candles. Every morning a small candle was lit, and every Sunday a large candle. Custom has retained only the large candles.

The keeping of an Advent wreath is a common practice in homes and churches. The Advent wreath is traditionally placed on a table with four candles or without candles, on the front door of the house as a welcome sign.

The Advent wreath is adorned with candles, usually three violet or purple and one pink, the pink candle being lit on the Third Sunday of Advent, called Gaudete Sunday or "Rejoice". Some add a fifth candle (white), known as the Christ Candle, in the middle of the wreath, to be lit on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day.

Other variations of the themes celebrated on each of the four Sundays include:

The Prophets' Candle, symbolizing hope; the Bethlehem Candle, symbolizing faith; the Shepherds' Candle, symbolizing joy; the Angel's Candle, symbolizing peace. Interesting information for your reading pleasure.

All men are welcome to attend.


