## *Change Is in the Wind*

We have been very please and excited to start outside worship services in September. On September 6, we had about 50 people, and on the 13th, we had 32.

We are now beginning to look toward the future and the ability to be inside the sanctuary. Do we know when that will be? **Yes, we will have inside services beginning October 4, baring many new COVID cases in Chino Valley.**

Information on the reservation system has been sent via email and will also be sent via snail mail and on our one call-tell all system.

Reservations open on Monday, at 8am for the following Sunday and closes on Thursday, at 4 pm. This week only, reservations will open at 1:00pm.

Example:

For Worship Service - Sunday, October 4

Reservations - opens Monday, September 28

Reservations - closes Thursday, October 1

All reservations will be confirmed on Friday or Saturday of that week and verified by email or phone call. It is imperative that all email addresses and contact phone information are up-to-date and provided to the office.

If people register for a service that is full, they will be contacted to reschedule as soon as possible after the request is received.

## *Office Schedule*

The office officially remains closed at the present time. We do have some staff and volunteers here most Mondays, so if you need to come by the office or talk to someone here, please call to be sure we are here.

We are also able to have at least some group meetings here, either outside or in the narthex.

## The Natural World

All creation is the Lord's, and we are responsible for the ways in which we use and abuse it. Water, air, soil, minerals, energy resources, plants, animal life, and space are to be valued and conserved because they are God's creation and not solely because they are useful to us as human beings. We must recognize the responsibility of the church and its members to place a high priority on changes in economic, political, social, and technological lifestyles to support a more ecologically equitable and sustainable world leading to a higher quality of life for all of God's creation.

What we read in this broad statement is how we as human beings treat the world that God has created matters and we must act responsibly in the use of His resources.

## The Nurturing Community

The term Nurturing Community starts with the personal family and is extended to include the rest of our towns, states, and countries.

Our community provides the potential for the development of human beings into the fullness of their human race. We believe we have a responsibility to innovate, sponsor, and evaluate new forms of community that will encourage development of the fullest potential in individuals. Our Gospel tells us that all persons are of importance – because they are human beings created by God and loved through and by Jesus Christ and not because they have deserved significance. WE, as United Methodists, support social climates in which human communities are maintained and strengthened for the sake of all persons and their growth. We also encourage all individuals to be sensitive to others by using appropriate language and actions.

Within this section we look at: culture and identity, the family, marriage, divorce, single persons, women and men, human sexuality, family violence and abuse, sexual abuse, sexual harassment, abortion, adoption, care for dying persons, suicide, sexual assault, pornography, and bullying. Note how the topics are asking us to be aware of each other and to support one another as Christians.

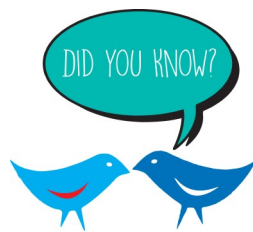
### Shoes from the Shepherd

At any time, you can choose a different charity or change the charity recipient. It is all up to you.

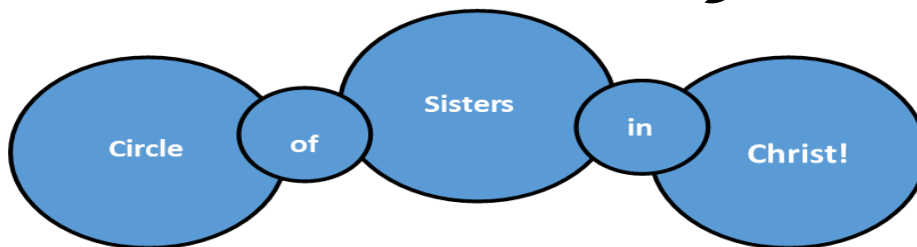
