#### A Word from Pastor Kevin

There are fewer things I love than going to the movies. There's something so magical about the whole process - going to the theater, being greeted by the usher and handed a ticket stub, waiting in line for popcorn with all the other guests and hearing their excited conversations, looking at all the posters in the hallway, choosing our seats. I love that the A/C is cranked so low in the theater that I can wear a sweatshirt in the summer. And to me, there are just few things better than the feeling I get in my soul when the lights dip down and the screen goes dark just before the first trailer starts.

Now, seems like everyone enjoys a great movie - but I am surprised at how many people that I know that do not like going to the theater. It's "not for them" - they don't like the crowds, the noise, or paying way too much for a soda. They prefer their chair, the snacks, and the company at their home.

So, what's "pure magic" for me isn't for them - the theater experience lights up my heart and my imagination, but for them, it doesn't. We might all love movies, but what makes a great movie experience can be so different.

The longer I work as a pastor, the more I realize that I can learn something about church from the movie theater. At our church we are all bound together by a common love - to worship God and serve others each day, and each week. And we love being together - which is good! In Hebrews 10, the author reminds their church of the importance of meeting together - the author believes that none of us comes to Jesus well by ourselves, but that we need to be together to encourage, serve, and grow.

But Hebrews doesn't say that there's only one right way to "meet" together - so long as we are building each other up in love, our time together might look very different. Just like how there's not one right way to watch and love a movie, there's no one right way to experience the love of God together at church. Some of us love different styles of music to sing, ways to pray, roles as volunteers - some of us love the energy in the crowd in the sanctuary, others might find they love their small group more.

I'm so happy that even across all our differences, and all our preferences, that at CVUMC we love God and that we truly love being together. Jesus says that when we gather in love, his Spirit is there, and when we love well, our neighbors will see God in us.

This summer, my prayer is that whether we are quiet or loud, in the crowd or with a few, singing or silent together, that the exciting magic of God's love will come up for each of us, and for our neighbors as well.

## <u>Updates from United Methodist Church</u> Annual and General Conferences

On Sunday June 29, we held an open meeting with the congregation to share the news and updates from our Annual Conference's gathering June 2025, and the General Conference of the UMC last year, 2024. In case you missed it, the following is a summary of the news we had to share:

#### **Desert Southwest Annual Conference 2025**

In June, Pastor Kevin Lester and Anita McFadden (Lay Representative to Annual Conference) were sent by CVUMC to Annual Conference - the yearly gathering of all the UMC churches in Arizona (and Las Vegas). It was a wonderful week of worship, learning, and fellowship with other churches. We completed the legislative business of the Conference.

Here are some highlights from the Annual Conference:

- In his keynote sermon, Bishop, Carlo Rapanut, continued to extend the call for all of our congregations to become "a health church for a healthy world" and to consider what actions we can all take to create "ripples of renewal" through our community.
- Together we approved the budget, financial reports, ministry reports and plans for the
  next year. We also voted on resolutions regarding the creation of a new area of ministry a committee to develop our "Welcoming, Affirming, Reconciling Ministries," divesting
  pension accounts from fossil fuels, and adjusting the educational requirements for
  Licensed Local Pastors.
- We also cast our votes regarding a series of amendments to the UMC's Constitution (part
  of the Book of Discipline) the most major of which regards a proposed plan for
  "Regionalization" of the Central Conferences, and the creation of a regional conference
  for the UMC in the USA. If this passes, it will cause some restructuring in the organization
  of the UMC in the hopes that our global churches can be better represented in the
  General Conference, while also allowing increased freedom for each Regional
  Conference to adapt our polity for their local context.
- We celebrated the ministries of our Conference that were planted this year, and those that
  are showing growth and changing their communities; honored the pastors, staff, and
  churches that are retiring or closing; and recognized the clergy that are progressing in
  their ordination status (Licensed Local Pastors, Provisional, and Fully-Commissioned
  Elders and Deacons).

#### **General Conference 2024**

It's been over a year, but the significant developments in the UMC that were confirmed, or initiated, at General Conference in spring of 2024 are having an effect on us today. For those of you who may not have been around during that time, you may not have heard about them enough - these movements are bigger than we can give them space for in this letter, but here is a quick recap of the noteworthy items - if you want more information, or want to discuss them, please contact Pastor Kevin (he would love to talk!).

The big developments of General Conference 2024 are often grouped as "the Three R's" - Regionalization, Removal, and Revision.

- "Regionalization" is a change in the organizational structure of the General and Central Conferences of the UMC the proposal "represented an effort to put the church's different geographical regions on equal footing and to make the General Conference less U.S.-centric. The current central conferences and the U.S. would become regional conferences, with the same authority to pass legislation for greater missional impact." This proposal was passed by a large majority, and Annual Conferences around the world will be voting this summer to either ratify, or reject, the Amending our Constitution to allow this change. Since this is a change in how the UMC is structured on a national and global level, we don't anticipate that Regionalization would have an observable effect on our life and ministry as a congregation at CVUMC. Those in favor of Regionalization believe, though, that it will empower the UMC in each country to operate more efficiently and effectively, and that it may also relieve some of the tensions between national bodies of the UMC, strengthening our fellowship as a global church.
- "Removal" is the term for the changes to the UMC's Book of Discipline regarding the removal and revising of language in the Discipline regarding LGBTQ persons in the UMC. This included a proposed removal of the language in the Discipline that was added in 1972 which describes the "practice of homosexuality... as incompatible with Christian teaching," as well as the accompanying bans on clergy who are "self-avowed practicing homosexuals," and on allowing clergy or congregations from officiating or performing same-sex weddings. These proposals also passed by an overwhelming majority at General Conference, and have gone into effect as of this year. In anticipation of the concerns that some congregations and clergy will have, the General Conference took extra action to specify that these changes will not compel any congregation to receive a gay pastor, and protects a congregation's and any pastor's rights to decide if they will host or officiate same-sex weddings.

• "Revision" is the adoption of the new version of our UMC "Social Principles." The Social Principles, contained in both the Book of Discipline and Book of Resolutions, are statements that reflect official United Methodist teachings on a wide range of topics. They are not church law but are intended to inform United Methodist witness on issues of the day with a biblical foundation. The 2012 General Conference approved revising the Social Principles, setting in motion a process that involved input from people around the world, coordinated by the General Board of Church and Society. The proposed "revised" Social Principles were approved by the delegates at General Conference - this is first time they have been significantly updated in fifty years. In addition to language changes regarding human sexuality and inclusiveness, the Social Principles also address the importance of advocating for human dignity and combating racism and other threats, caring for creation and the environment, standing against social ills, and supporting healthy community in all its forms, including economic, social and political.

I'm sure there is a good amount of great discussion that we have together at CVUMC that will continue to help us build fellowship and ministry, and help us live out our connection to the larger UMC. These developments in our denomination have led to both celebration and concern for many of us.

#### A Reprieve!

Have you been worrying about what you will do when Microsoft stops supporting Windows 10 on October 15th?

I know a lot of you have computers that don't have the hardware required to upgrade to Windows 11, and you're not all that excited about the expense and hassle of changing to a newer computer. Maybe you haven't even figured out if your computer hardware can be upgraded to make it Windows 11 capable?

Well, we've just been given another year to work on it. Microsoft announced a new policy recently that expands their Extended Security Updates (ESU) program for corporate customers to include home users, and makes it essentially free for one year.

What's happening on 10/15/25 is that Microsoft will no longer provide technical support nor any type of updates for Windows 10, and that will not change according to every public statement made by the company, with the exception of ESU.

The ESU program, for businesses that can't or won't change their software, offers important security updates in exchange for a small yearly fee per computer. Those updates are the ones absolutely needed by the computer to avoid any hacking or virus attacks through newly discovered vulnerabilities. Now consumers can get ESU for one year by paying \$30, using 1000 Microsoft Reward points, or by signing in with a Microsoft account and allowing your user information to be saved in your Microsoft account. This last option is free to set up, and will probably cost you nothing more than a bit in unwanted advertising in the future – pretty good deal, I think.

So, to wrap up, you don't have to worry about changing your Windows 10 computer by October after all! You just need to register for the ESU program, and if you need any help with that, give me a call or email – I'm in the directory.




